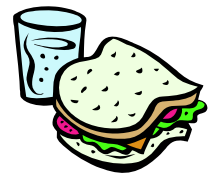

With the weather being so hot lately, we try to go outside everyday in the morning after breakfast. The children love the sandbox and the new slides. When we go out, we also do a mini science lesson about the fruit trees, plants, birds and insects. The children love to look at the

bugs and spiders crawling around on the ground. We have just been given a sensory table. Children learn through their senses. Exposure to different textures help to develop fine motor skills. Other concepts are also developed such as "big/little", "in/out", "off/on"
